AIRPORT CONNECTOR ROAD PROJECT



PROJECT INFORMATION

The **Airport Connector Road Project (ACR Project)** was initiated by Charleston County Government to provide improved traffic operations and to support economic development goals for the Charleston County area.

The ACR Project will provide a new direct access road to Charleston International Airport and should relieve traffic congestion by providing a new connection from Dorchester Road to Montague Avenue near the Mark Clark Expressway (I-526).

The initial concept is to build over 3 miles of a new, four-lane road, which will provide locals and visitors with a new route to the airport.

Charleston County plans to begin acquiring right-of-way in July 2014 and to go to construction late 2015.
